From March to June, HIPPY Halton delivered books and activity packages and home visits online. This change in regular programming proved to be very stressful for our HIPPY moms with the added challenges of using new technology compounded with family stress – financial worries, overcrowding, time constraints, home schooling for their other children and isolation.

HIPPY's Home Visitors faced similar stresses - in addition to learning a variety of new platforms in order to serve families in an unprecedented way. Home Visitors had to quickly learn how to teach online while juggling their families' needs.

To help counteract the negative pressures during the lockdown and over the summer, HIPPY Halton posted daily additional activities and blogs on Instagram and Facebook for the community's use and information. Our weekly blog continues and our 280+ posts continue to be very popular!

Thank you to ALL our families - whether you remained for the whole program or had to take a little break and return to complete the 30 week program. Thank you to ALL our Home Visitors - you provided a critical lifeline to the isolated and lonely mothers while you role-played the activities together. Your empathy and encouragement made a significant difference in their lives. And your smiles, support and care helped many of our families say "Yes, I can get through today".

Together, this pandemic has demonstrated our collective resilience and determination to succeed. It gives us strength to wake up each morning, hug our children, and share with them, our enormous love and courage.

THRIVING IN SCHOOL, AT HOME, & BEYOND

HIPPY Halton is a multi-cultural community of parents, their pre-school children and Home Visitors who embrace early learning through shared teaching.

We provide free, well researched, 30-week, preschool education in Oakville, Milton and Burlington for newcomers, working poor, isolated and vulnerable families. Research demonstrates that children who lag at school entry, seldom if ever catch up.

Our curriculum is based on children's literature and activity packages that support each book. Peer Home Visitors and mothers spend an hour each week role playing the activities that teach children the essential pre-reading, pre-writing and premath skills required for success in Kindergarten and beyond.











Mothers spend 20 minutes for each of the next 5 days teaching their own children. Their Home Visitor will check the completed work at the next visit and answer any questions and provide support and encouragement. Samples of work are saved to demonstrate the child's progress.

Home Visitors also assist in settlement challenges and teach mothers that they have a role to play in their child's education and as advocates in their local schools and communities.

Fortnightly group meetings develop parenting skills, peer groups and support for mothers and children. Appreciating others' needs and customs helps to build a community free of racism, prejudice and misunderstandings.


HIPPY children are confident and ready to learn when they enter school. Mothers build their relationships with their children, their English literacy skills and their understanding of the schools' and community's expectations.

Home Visitors are paid a Living Wage in their first job in Canada. They learn Canadian work culture, build a CV while they improve their English literacy skills.




HOW HAS YOUR SUPPORT HELPED?

HIPPY Halton is a registered charity and is audited each year. Our full financial statements are available on the CRA website. HIPPY is compliant with its policy to have resources to cover its commitment of two years of program costs for each child enrolled.

Our most recent audit revealed that we spent 97 cents of ever dollar on direct program costs: salaries and training for Home Visitors curriculum materials, children's picture books, group meetings and the Celebrations of Learning.


The remaining 3 cents of every dollar were spent on costs such as bookkeeping, audit fees and bank charges.
